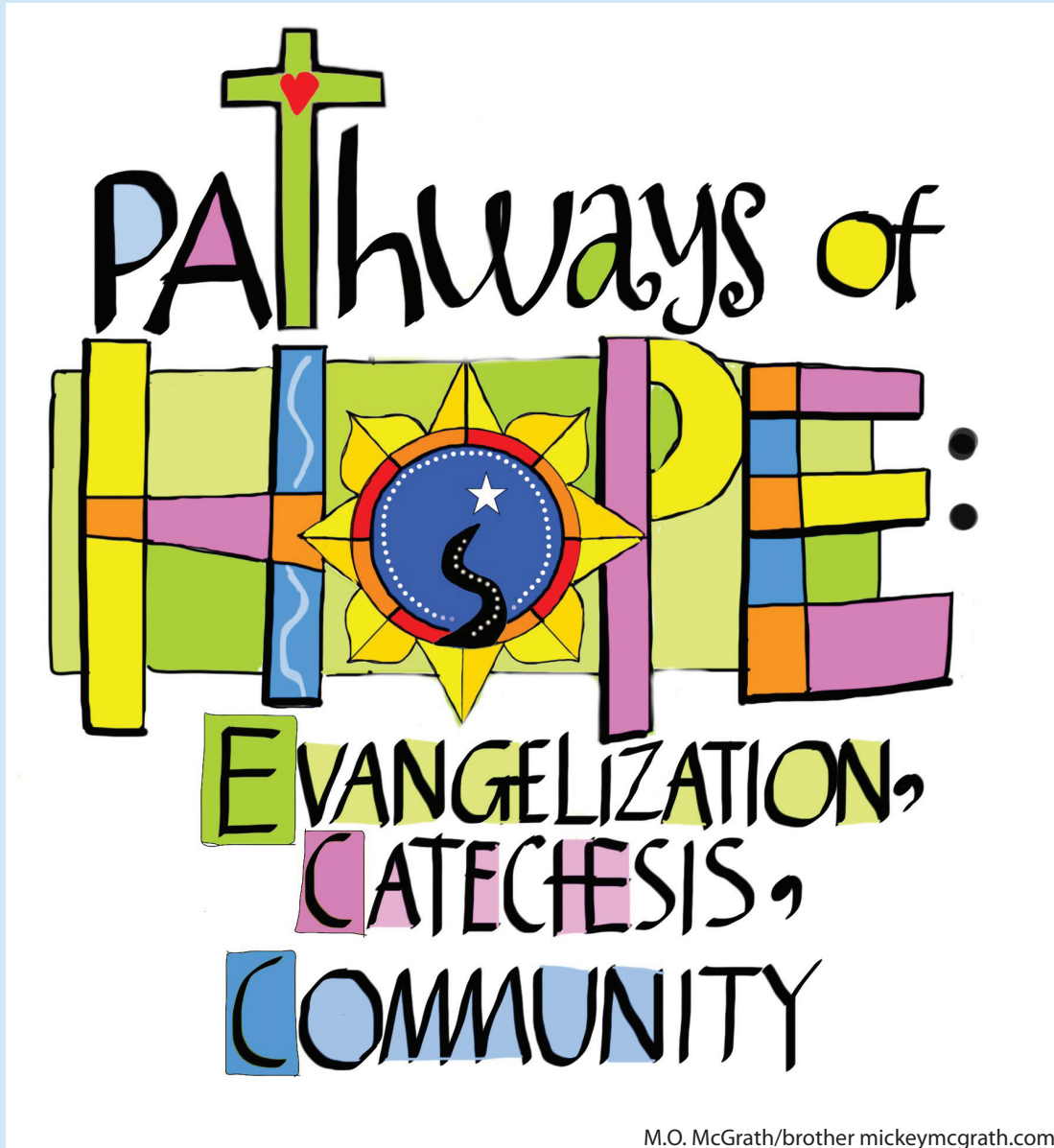

In the various circumstances of daily life... all the followers of Christ have the obligation of spreading the faith according to their abilities. Hence the entire community must help the candidates and catechumens through the process of initiation...”(RCIA 9). How then, is each member of the parish community invited to participate in the catechumenal process? How might the parish -- its members and its mission -- be strengthened in turn?

As we celebrate the 25th anniversary of the Catechism of the Catholic Church, the time is right to look back on this moment in evangelization and explore some questions: why did the Bishops feel the need to publish a new Catechism, what do we really know about the Catechism, how do we incorporate this religious education tool into our catechesis, is it realistic to believe that an encounter with the Catechism can truly lead to an encounter with the living Christ? Only an affirmative answer to this final question is acceptable. All of us engaged in catechesis know the parable of the sower from Mark's gospel where, after telling this parable to a large crowd by the sea, Jesus concludes by saying, “He who has ears to hear, let him hear.” A catechist is meant to provoke an echo in the minds and hearts of those in their care so that they might experience a transformation, a conversion. Are those we serve in our ministries truly hearing, are they encountering the living Christ? These are the key questions to be discussed in this presentation.

(C4) RCIA as the Ministry of Accompaniment

GENERAL SESSION – 5

Engaging Parents in the Journey: Rethinking HOW We Do WHAT We Do to “Build Parental Capacity”

Catechetical leaders continually try to encourage and engage parents in faith formation, some approaches more successful than others. But not all parents have the capacity to talk about, model, and witness their faith with their children. They need faith formation too. We need to focus more on how we build the capacity of parents rather than looking for a program that magically will make it happen. Our choices and decisions in program implementation (HOW we do WHAT we do) can work for or against parent engagement and involvement in the faith formation of their children. This session will help catechetical leaders reflect on “Pathways of Hope” that lead to building parental capacity to be the primary educators in the faith for their children. Participants will leave with ideas to consider for their pathways in their parish.
